



JIM GREENSHIELDS TO BREAK OWN WORLD RECORD FOR THE MOST FIXEDWING AIRCRAFT FLOWN SOLO IN ONE DAY

Jim Greenshields a flying instructor from Dunkeswell Devon hopes to break his own Guinness world record on the 4.8.2018 by flying more than 50 aircraft to 2000 ft and back solo in one day, the record currently stands at 43.

Jim will be attempting the record to raise funds and awareness for the Make-A-Wish foundation UK, a charity that grants wishes to children and young people fighting life-threatening conditions.

Jim has over 11000 hrs flying time logged in over 200 aircraft types, vintage , aerobatic and modern, and has raised thousands of pounds of Make-A-Wish over the years.

"We set the record of 43 aircraft in 2014 to raise funds for Make-A-Wish but ran out of aircraft with daylight still left , so this year we are again appealing to all aircraft owners to lend their aircraft to help raise some cash for this fabulous charity and have a grand day out with tea and buns at the same time!"

The record will start 30 min before daybreak on Saturday the 4th August 2018 and finish 30min after sunset, each fixedwing aircraft must be flown solo to 2000ft and back. August the 11th will be the backup date if the weather is poor.
